It was supposed to belong to the county EC but the actual paperwork of ownership has since been lost like most of the historical information about it. It was to be emblazoned with lettering designating it as an "Emergency Communications" trailer on the sides and on the roof (so that airplanes could identify it from above). It took many club meetings to accomplish this, as there was difficultly getting a consensus as to how to accomplish the task. After many unsuccessful attempts to resolve it, mainly due to our treasurer's unwillingness to approve the funds need to have it so painted, our President at the time went ahead and had it painted and so it was done. I'm not sure who paid for the painting of it, but once done it has remained so emblazoned. As time wore on the trailer's location was "lost" by the CEC and so it has remained with our club ever since.

About ten years ago I was assigned the task of refitting it to fulfill it's designated task. At the time I was the event coordinator for our annual Field Day Event. Several people volunteered to help with that project, but no one showed up to help, so I enlisted my wife and one of my sons to help me with it. As I recall a budget of \$150.00 was greed upon so I proceeded to make it happen. I scrounged up material from where ever I could find it and the refurbishing of the trailer was completed in time for the event. Wood for the operating positions was donated by Western Wisconsin Technical College's Wood Working Department and various other materials were found here and there to complete the task. The trailer was to have a dual purpose for our club. It was to house all of our radio equipment as well as its designated use as a communication trailer. This was a compromised arrangement as that equipment took up most of the room in that small trailer, so that when we wanted to use it operate as a communication trailer all of that "stuff" had to be removed to make room for radio operations. Over time, it was further modified to include solar panels and a battery system to make it truly a mobile radio

Since then it has been in use for Field Day Events, Parks on the Air Events and other Special Events put on by the RARC. There are now several people who want to get rid of it, but so far it remains at Greg Miller KA9FOZ's QTH where he stores it and cares for it. I hope that this clarifies some of the history of that trailer. Feel free to add and further information about that trailer. A circulator is oftentimes used at a radio site that is plexer. Tuning can be factory provided when ordering through a congested with other transmitters and has a lot of RF in the ar- commercial vendor. They also can be field tuned ea. A circulator can also be considered a "one way valve" that to a certain degree, if passes RF energy out to the antenna, but does not allow RF back a frequency change. to the transmitter or power amplifier, thereby protecting equipment from large reflected signals (from antenna or feedline failure for example.) The isolator also can be used for reflected power detection and measurement as well as decoupling amplifier stages.

The circulator is typically a part of a larger device referred to as an intermodulation suppression panel. The suppression panel consists of one or more isolators, a low pass filter, and one or more dummy loads. It provides a constant 50 ohm load protecting the transmitter from faults in the antenna system as


